Introduction

For generations children have held the soft, cuddly teddy bear close to their hearts. Its comforting presence has been with them throughout many childhood events, both happy and sad. Its smiling face has offered unconditional love and acceptance, a faithful and trusted companion always willing to listen and be there for them.

Today we'll explore these qualities that have made the teddy bear such a success for well over a hundred years.

History of the teddy bear

The teddy bear got its name from U.S. President Theodore ("Teddy") Roosevelt. In 1902, Roosevelt was in a hunting party in Mississippi where he refused to shoot a wounded black bear, saying it was "unsportsmanlike" to do so. As the president who put the National Park Act through Congress, Roosevelt was concerned about conservation and taking care of the environment. This hunting incident made the national news as a political cartoon in the *Washington Post*.

In 1903 Brooklyn, NY toymaker Morris Michtom and his wife Rose designed a stuffed bear toy based on the cartoon image. He even wrote the president and got Roosevelt's permission to name the toy after him. By 1906 there were many teddy bear companies in the U.S. producing a wide variety of practical and novelty teddy bears. It was fashionable for children to have their photo taken with their teddy bears. Even Roosevelt himself used one as a mascot in his bid for re-election.

Early teddy bears were made to look like real bears. Today's bears are more attractive due to their cuteness and cuddliness.

As Christians we need to be attractive because the same qualities that make teddy bears special should also make us special.

1) **Unconditional love**

Commentary

God loves us fully, freely and without conditions. That should fill us with joy to know God is always with us whether we're having a good day or a bad one. A parent's love towards a child is similar, whether the youngster is helpful and happy or grumpy and grouchy.

No wonder that a teddy bear represents this quality to a little boy or girl: always ready to receive a hug, always smiling, always there for the child to love unconditionally.

Jack Wilkins in Hospital

When Barbara's brother Jack was seven years old his coat got caught in the power take-off of the tractor. The result was two broken legs, a punctured lung and a broken arm. He was rushed to Victoria General Hospital in London, ON miles away from family and friends. His mother stayed with him during the day, but in the evening, she went to where she was staying with relatives. Jack found the nights quite lonely and frightening after all he was only seven years old. When his Aunt Lou heard about this, she knitted him a teddy bear. This made a great difference for Jack because the teddy bear was a constant companion and connection with the family when no one was around.

When Aunt Lou saw that it made a big difference to her nephew during his time in hospital, she began a teddy bear ministry that continued for 40 years, making and distributing knitted teddy bears to children in area hospitals. Hundreds of children received help this way during the difficult days following surgery or illness.

When Barbara left Ontario in 1999 to begin her ministry in Saskatchewan, Aunt Lou made her a "Patches" doll to be her constant companion as she settled in the West.

3) Caring companion

Teddy bears have also served that purpose for thousands of children, whether at play outside in the yard or beside them in bed at night.
